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Share the Journey

"Not only so, but we also glory in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces perseverance; perseverance, character; and character, hope. And hope does not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit, who has been given to us."

(Romans 5:3-5)

In reflecting on this article, I was really touched by the powerful way these lines from Paul's Letter to the Romans reflect the life and legacy of Venerable Cornelia Connelly. Her suffering was so real and so deeply personal that it certainly touched her heart and life in a profound way. Her suffering did indeed seem to bring forth perseverance, character and hope. She turned her suffering into a deep trust in God and a real zest for meeting "the wants of her age."

In 1865, Cornelia Connelly dared to dream of raising up a chapel, an orphanage, a novitiate and a school. In spite of all odds, she dared to dream and persisted. She saw the growing need for education for young women, especially factory workers and mill girls. She felt the call to teach and reach them wherever they were holding classes in the evenings and on weekends. Today's needs have changed,

and we also focus on the hungry, the immigrant, the refugee, the unaccompanied child. With the perseverance and tenacity of Cornelia, SHCJ sisters and Associates dare to dream and act to build a world rooted in compassion.

One specific way this has happened has been through the Wants of the Age (WOTA) com-

mittee. Under the leadership of Sr. Marcia Sichol SHCJ, WOTA works "to do all we can, individually and together, to alleviate the struggle and suffering of migrants, internally displaced persons, refugees and asylum seekers in whatever parts of the world

we find ourselves. Specifically, as a Society, funds have been allocated strategically to meet both emergency and long-term needs, locally, regionally and internationally."

One very current and major need is the result of cuts in USAID (United States Agency for International Development). As a result of draconian cuts, many international Church assistance agencies, such as Catholic Relief Services have been forced to shut down projects. These cuts are leading to hunger, malnutrition and even death. One country of real concern is Sudan. Thanks to a grant from WOTA, Catholic Relief Services will be able to keep 26 health and nutrition facilities open during a time when many other local systems have collapsed. These facilities provide services to approximately 24,000 individuals per month, including 719 children under five with an estimated caseload of 350.



Perseverance and tenacity are gifts from the legacy of Cornelia. In this Spring season of new life, may all of us carry on Cornelia's spirit to try in whatever way we feel called to make a difference. As Cornelia herself shared - "We never know what we can do until we try. Perseverance gains the crown."

Meet the Associates

New Collaborative Associates

The journey to commitment as a Collaborative Associate is as individual as each Associate. Our three newest Collaborative Associates share how God drew them to association with the Society of the Holy Child Jesus, highlighting their unique paths.

Associate Sandy Lovascio says that making her formal commitment was her "Holy Child life coming full circle." She first encountered the SHCJ at St. Leonard's Academy in Philadelphia, PA during her early school years. Even as a child, the uniqueness of her experience left a lasting impression that kept her connected to the Sisters. She later sent her own children to a Holy Child school, further deepening her bond with the Society. Twenty years ago, she took on the role of Mission Advancement Director

for the American Province, where her understanding of the charism and commitment to the mission grew significantly.

For Associate Jessica Keaveney, the connection began later in her life. After growing up in Media, PA, she began her professional life working with people in need, first at a non-profit, supporting low-income

the Holy Child charism and mission. She says "the feeling grew over time" that association with the SHCJ resonated with her spirituality, values and way of life.

Associate Patti Cepparulo serves as Lower School Religion Teacher, Religion Program Coordinator and After School Program Coordinator at Oak Knoll School of the Holy Child in Summit, NJ. She met the SHCJ during the interview process for her current position. Patti was particularly inspired by the words of Cynthia Vives, SHCJ who was Head of School at the time. It was from Sr. Cynthia that she learned about the charism and mission of the Society. Over her 40 years at Oak Knoll, she gradually felt a calling to become a "minister of God's word" through prayer,

action and teaching.

The three Associates credit significant moments in their faith journeys that led them to the Holy Child Associates. Patti acknowledges the example of her parents' strong Catholic faith with motivating her desire for God. From them, she saw "the importance of faith and love in everyday life." Jessica remembers

women and their children in staying together, then at an early childhood education program in their corporate office. The seeds of seeing God in the humble and hidden were planted. As Human Resource Director for the Province, she came into contact with a defining moment of "deep grief and loss." During that time, faith became her anchor, providing "unexpected blessings in the midst of pain." It became a transformative experience in her relationship with God. She brings that perspective now "to others facing their own trials." Sandy's faith developed through her twelve years of Catholic education. Through those years, she recognized the uniqueness of the Cornelian way of connecting with God, which resonated with her own approach to living out her faith.

When asked to consider a formal commitment to the Associates, each of them had very personal approaches. Jessica was attracted to the Associates but didn't understand fully what it meant to be an Associate. The Discernment Process for Collaborative Associates provided her with "the perfect opportunity to explore it." At the end of the process, she knew "this is exactly where I was meant to be." Sandy says she was intimidated when asked to pursue commitment. Catherine Quinn, SHCJ, Cathi Duffy and other Associates pointed out that she was already living the vision and mission of the Associates in her daily life and professional work. The discernment process confirmed and deepened that awareness.

Patti had been part of an Associate prayer group for several years. She said, "I never felt I needed a formal title to know that I was part of this group." Gradually, she realized that as a committed Associate, she could "more easily spread the word about this incredible

community and the work of Cornelia Connelly." She completed her discernment with Sr. Cynthia.

Both Jessica and Sandy were asked by their Associate Mentor, Judy Talvacchia, if they would be willing to do the discernment together and online with Judy. The discernment material, previously used with great success in a printed binder, had been recently moved online. The hope is to accommodate the needs of Associates who are not physically near a mentor or who prefer a group format, regardless of location. Jessica, Sandy and Judy were the first to use the online process. All three agree that it worked well. Jessica and Sandy appreciated sharing each other's reflections and experiences. Judy liked the ability to access resources easily and to add new resources as they became available. Feedback from Jessica and Sandy was invaluable for Judy to refine and enhance the process and the material.

The commitment ceremonies of these Associates reflected their individual approaches. Patti made her commitment on October 15, 2024, during the Founders Day celebration at Oak Knoll. This gave Patti the joy of sharing the gifts of Association with faculty, staff, students, parents, Sisters and Associates

both in person and via livestream. Jessica and Sandy celebrated on February 19, 2025, during an intimate prayer service at Holy Child Chapel, Rosemont, PA. Sisters, colleagues, Associates and guests present joined them for a joyful celebration afterwards in the Holy Child Center dining room.

So how are the new Collaborative Associates living the mission now? Along with her professional role as HR Director, Jessica lives the mission in her very full personal life, beginning with her husband and three teenagers. She has a passion for story telling through creative writing and in film as a background actor. She has become more mindful of her interactions in all these areas, knowing that she is "part of a community united by a shared purpose – to reveal God's presence and action in the world."

Sandy attempts to "joyfully, compassionately and spiritually journey in a world in constant flux." She delights in her connection with Sisters and Associates who help her "continue to grow in Cornelia's

charism and spirit." She hopes to deepen her relationship with God and engage her faith in "Actions Not Words."

Patti delights in her sons Joe and Ben, and daughter Jessica who also teaches at Oak Knoll. Her most recent pride and joy is her granddaughter, Lucelia Ann. Each morning, she reflects on the mission she has accepted and tries to live it throughout the day being all that God wants her to be, seeing the good in others and reminding others of it when they can't see it in themselves. Her dearest hope is "to inspire someone just as Sister Cynthia inspired me."

Poetry Off the Shelf

"Let This Darkness Be a Bell Tower"

by Rainer Maria Rilke, translated by Joanna Macy

Quiet friend who has come so far,

feel how your breathing makes more space around you.

Let this darkness be a bell tower and you the bell. As you ring,

what batters you becomes your strength.

Move back and forth into the change.

What is it like, such intensity of pain?

If the drink is bitter, turn yourself to wine.

In this uncontainable night, be the mystery at the crossroads of your senses, the meaning discovered there.

And if the world has ceased to hear you, say to the silent earth: I flow.

To the rushing water, speak: I am.

Sonnets to Orpheus II, 29

When "Let This Darkness Be a Bell Tower" was featured back in the winter 2014 issue of this newsletter, each beautiful line of poetry was offered as a guide to inner transformation. Cornelia's concept of accepted suffering – the bitter drink that turns oneself to wine, as Rilke puts it – is deeply personal: "the mystery at the crossroads of your senses." The choice to revisit this poem now had to do with another aspect of Cornelia's vision: actions, not words. In this tumultuous spring of 2025, there is a need to ring out: "speak: I am."

Imagine the very first line of this poem as the starting point: 2014. You are the "quiet friend," and as you reflect on your associate's journey of prayer, contemplation, and service, "your breathing makes more space around you." Then the future unfolds and the challenges feel overwhelming. Rilke advises, "Move back and forth into the change." In Romans 5:3-5, Paul tells us that with God's love poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit, we can go from suffering to perseverance to strong character and, at last, to hope. For Cornelia perseverance was the answer to whatever life threw at her. Hope is a virtue that allows us to act because we are confident in God's goodness.

To experience hardship and pain is part of the human condition; can we allow it to transform us into compassionate beings who will be a voice for the voiceless, to ring out in love and truth, to act on what we believe? Listen to our dear Cornelia when she counsels, "We never know what we can do until we try." Let the beauty of this poem strengthen our resolve to be, if I may paraphrase the Jesuit mantra, mystics for others!
